#### The Hospitality Trade Training Centre Recognition Ceremony

The Gundagai High School Hospitality Trade Training Centre was opened by the Hon Michael McCormack MP, Member for Riverina on Friday 8<sup>th</sup> November, 2013.

This ceremony is a celebration of the **team work**, by many groups of people, that has gone



into the process to be able to have this facility. We can count ourselves very fortunate.

For Gundagai High School, this process began back in 2009, when the first discussions were taking place between the school and the Vocational Education and Training Unit about making an application for Federal Funding.

Throughout 2010 support from the local community, businesses, the shire council and parents was gained. Their enthusiastic support was great encouragement to know that this was a project that the whole community was behind. From there the application grew with staff consultation on areas such as kitchen layout and equipment. Finally the application was completed.



The support of Gundagai High School staff, especially our Hospitality Teacher, Mrs Bronwyn Hunt who has been involved in the kitchen design, equipment purchases and establishing the Industry Standards environment which is integral to the Trade Training Centre and her efforts have been outstanding.

## Congratulations to James Petty on his successful application for the Premier's ANZAC Memorial

*Scholarships.* Each year the scholarship funds study tours for up to twenty young people to travel to one or more sites associated with the ANZAC tradition. Special consideration is given to applicants whose current financial, personal or family circumstances would normally preclude them from overseas travel.

The Selection Panel considered all scholarship applications closely and was impressed by the high standard of the applicants and obvious deep interest in ANZAC history.

The *Premier's ANZAC Memorial Scholarships* provide a unique opportunity for students of history to participate in an overseas pilgrimage to sites of significance in the lead up to the Centenary of ANZAC 2014-2018. To date, over 60 students from secondary schools across NSW have travelled to Asian and/or European battlefields to participate in commemorations

The Premier has stated that the scholarship is about ensuring "that the ANZAC story remains a living part of our history, now that all the original Diggers are gone."

James leaves this Saturday 16<sup>th</sup> November, 2013 for the Western Front in France and will return home via London for his two week trip. We look forward to hearing all about his trip on his return.

Heart Foundation

We meet here today, not to glorify war or praise its victors, but to remember those who have served our country during times of conflict and crisis, and to reflect upon their selfless sacrifice.

Today marks the 95<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the armistice which ended the First World War. At 11 am on 11 November 1918, the guns on the Western Front fell silent after more than four years of continuous warfare. World War I saw 70 million soldiers worldwide rise to the call of duty and over half of them die on the battlefields. Three hundred and thirty-two thousand Australians fought in the Great War with the First Australian Imperial Force. Sixty thousand died and 152,000 were wounded. Those grim statistics meant that only one out of every three Australians who went to the war got through it unharmed, at least physically. With a population only of about four million, Australia had, proportionate to forces fielded, the highest casualties in the British Empire.

I believe it's important for my generation and future generations to continue this tradition and commemorate the sacrifice of Australia's Veterans. The Stone of Remembrance in Belgium reads "Their name liveth for evermore". If younger generations aren't taken to Remembrance Day ceremonies as children they won't take their children and the tradition will soon be lost. "Those who ignore history are doomed to repeat it".

Few people understand the significance of the minute of silence we undertake. The idea for the minute silence originated with Edward Honey, a Melbourne journalist and First World War veteran who was living in London in 1919. He wrote a letter to the London Evening News in which he appealed for a period of silence, to honour the sacrifice of those who had died during the war. King George V readily agreed to the proposal. The King requested that "a complete suspension of all our normal activities" be observed at "the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month" so that "in perfect stillness the thoughts of everyone may be concentrated on reverent remembrance of the Glorious Dead".

What is remembering? – How do I remember something that I didn't actually witness myself? I wasn't on the battlefields or even alive during times of war, so how do I remember something I have only been taught about? The dictionary defines remembrance as "a memory or recollection". I believe it's much more than this. To actively remember our veterans and the sacrifice they made we have to get involved in ceremonies like Remembrance Day and ANZAC Day. Next Saturday I am leaving Australia and going on a tour in Europe of the Western Front for two weeks. I won a history scholarship to visit museums and battlefields to remember Australia's soldiers and to learn about their involvement in these areas. I look forward to sharing my experiences with many of you when I return.

Every year we remember those who have fallen, but today I would like to also mention those who are still here with us. The fact that you did come home to us and continued with your lives has helped make our community the great place it is today. I have always felt a great respect for all soldiers, in particular the ones I could see and look up to. So during these services I find myself also thinking of the veterans around me, feeling so proud of them and grateful for the services that they have done for our country. I have been inspired by this to pursue a career in the ADF. I hope to be attending the Australian Defence Force Academy in 2015 but for now I would like to personally thank all those here today and past who have served in the military, I would also like to thank their families for supporting them. We are all grateful for their service to our country.

Let's all remember them.

Good morning all. My name is Holly Ingold, and I am here today to speak on behalf of my peers at Gundagai High School.

We're all gathered here today to acknowledge Remembrance Day, and pay our respects to the sacrifice of our soldiers, past, present, and future. All over Australia, people have stopped for the one minute's silence to remember and appreciate the great gift we have been given—one of a free, prosperous country with a history we can be proud of.

When my family have searched my great grandfather, Neville Regan, on the World War II Nominal Roll, it simply says "date of birth: unknown". This is because, like thousands of other young men at the time, he lied about his date of birth to hide his age, so he may go off to fight in the war. He was 17, the same age I am right now, when he was sent to fight in the Kokoda Campaign. The Kokoda Campaign has become one of the ANZAC soldier's most aweinspiring battles, due to the extraordinary conditions these everyday men and women faced.

So close to home and in such terrible terrain, it's an incredible tale of bravery and mateship, true to form with all other ANZAC battles. Any Australian can appreciate the courage it took for these soldiers, and we can learn important lessons to be incorporated into our everyday life. Strong ties of friendship, loyalty and standing up for any cause you have a passion for are values that are relevant to every Australian.

While celebrating Remembrance Day, we must consider what it really means to remember. To me, this goes much further than sparing a few moments to consider the brave actions of our soldiers. It is about incorporating the aforementioned values into our everyday lives as much as possible. Remembering with our actions, appreciating and utilising our freedom, is the best way to respect the sacrifices of our diggers.
